Calculators, & computational aids: Calculators and graphing apps will be used in order to facilitate learning new concepts. Calculators and computational aides are <u>not</u> allowed on quizzes or exams. You should be able to solve every problem without such aides.

Course description: Topics include advanced equations and inequalities, functions and graphs including composite and inverse functions, logarithmic and exponential functions, trigonometric functions and their graphs, right angle trigonometry, trigonometric identities, systems of equations, and conics.

Course goals: This course is primarily meant as preparation for calculus. You will solidify your understanding of algebra and functions. Trigonometric functions and methods will be covered extensively with an introduction to exponentials and logarithms.

- (A) use the basic modes of inquiry and expression of the disciplines that represent liberal education.

- (1) Students will be able to reproduce and create logical mathematical arguments. (A)
- (2) Students will be able to perform calculations appropriate to the content of this mathematics course. (C)
- (3) Students will be able to communicate mathematics in writing. (C)
- (4) Students will be able to apply mathematics to problems in other disciplines. (A)

Grades are calculated as a percentage and rounded to the nearest whole number percentage in the standard way (e.g. 79.5% is rounded up to 80% and any grade in [79, 79.5)% is rounded down to 79%). Letter grades are assigned according to your course average as follows: 90-100% is an A, 80-89% is a B, 70-79% is a C, 60-69% is a D, and 0-59% is an F. I reserve the right to assign "+" and "-" to letter grades at my discretion.

A note on collaboration and working in groups: Students are encouraged to work together on homework assignments and to study in groups. Helping other students and being helped by fellow students is a great way to learn. However, you cannot claim to have solved a problem if you are not able to complete it on your own. It is generally acceptable that someone explain the solution to you or that you find the solution from other sources on assignments where collaboration and access to other resources is allowed, however, you can not copy that solution down and claim to have solved the problem. You must be able to produce the solution from scratch on your own.

Homework and other assignments: There will be regular assignments posted on WeB-WorK. Suggested additional homework assignments will be assigned from the textbook. There may also be other homework assignments or other in-class assignments or worksheets from time-to-time. You are advised to work more problems than assigned though.

Exams and quizzes: There will be several regular quizzes, regular exams, and a comprehensive final exam. Exams will happen at regular intervals, and there will be roughly one to two quizzes between successive exams. The comprehensive final will be at the assigned time during the final exam period. The use of any materials such and notes, books, online or other references (but not limited to these) or any electronic devices during exams and quizzes is strictly prohibited unless specifically authorized by the instructor. Make-up exams and quizzes will only be given in extenuating circumstances at the discretion of your instructor and may include more difficult questions.
